

Management Techniques Docket Management

- Justice Kaye G. Hearn is Chair of the Docket Management Task Force
- Task Force oversees three subcommittees comprised of judges, clerks, lawyers, and Court Administration staff to review and improve the civil, criminal, and family courts
- > Three Subcommittees:
 - 1. <u>Circuit Court Common Pleas (Civil Trials)</u> Judge Daniel F. Pieper, Chair Judge Clifton Newman, Co-Chair
 - 2. <u>Circuit Court General Sessions (Criminal Trials)</u> Justice Costa M. Pleicones, Chair Judge Roger Couch, Co-Chair
 - 3. <u>Family Court (Domestic Relations and Juvenile)</u> Judge Aphrodite K. Konduros, Chair Judge Dorothy Jones, Co-Chair





Docket Management Task Force

> The Docket Management Task Force will address:

- 1. Use of court time
- 2. Staffing patterns and needs
- Court calendaring and scheduling especially in light of the fact that all 16 Solicitors now have the state technology system and differentiated case management
- 4. Leverage lessons learned from other states and federal courts
- 5. Tools and consultants from the NCSC will provide performance measures, research and technical assistance
- 6. Input will be sought from representatives of all court stakeholders
- 7. Improve the predictability, consistency, uniformity and effectiveness in the courts

> The Task Force plenary meeting was held on February 17th



Why is the Docket Management Task Force Necessary?

- SC Courts have not had any new judge positions in the Circuit or Family Courts since 1997
- State population and case complexities continue to increase




States averaged 1,755 filings per judge and 3.89 judges per 100,000 population in 2008

SC Court's Business Model






SCJD Strategic Technology Plan


- Our approach was to use an internet based platform as the basis to manage court operations.
- Five fundamental technology initiatives:
 - 1. Network connectivity
 - 2. Statewide case management
 - 3. Web portal
 - 4. Call center
 - 5. Document management Imaging







Connectivity in Our 46 Counties



Initial efforts were to get reliable, <u>high-speed internet connectivity</u> to the main courthouse in each county

All 46 counties now have <u>wide area</u> <u>networks (WANs)</u>

SCJD is now hosting the statewide court case management system for the rural counties

Upon completion of the deployment,
<u>29 counties</u> will be hosted by SCJD




Status of the Statewide Court Case Management System (CMS) for Circuit and Magistrate Courts

> Technology initiatives have been funded nearly entirely by federal grants

- Judicial reserves resulting from past financial prudence were depleted over the past 2 years
- > Federal funds need to be replaced with a sustainable funding source



SCJD Impact on South Carolina's Economy

- ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT Ability of the Judicial Branch to fairly and timely resolve disputes is a highly important consideration in economic development:
 - South Carolina Business Courts
 - Significant consideration in Boeing coming to South Carolina
- REVENUE GENERATION Through court filing fees and fines, holding court last year generated:
 - More than \$109M for state government
 - Additional \$26M for county governments
- EFFICIENCY SCJD is the most efficient judiciary in the nation doing more with less than any other state court





Beginning a Sustainable Funding Model for Court Technologies

- > At present, SCJD provides:
 - 1. Implementation of the CMS software for the Circuit and Magistrate Courts, data conversion, and training at no cost to the counties
 - 2. Ongoing call center support 24 x 7 to the counties
 - 3. Ongoing software support and maintenance to the application
- > At present, counties pay annual fees for:
 - 1. Software support by all counties

- 2. Hosting operations by counties hosted by SCJD

Note that county payments are minimal; fees set to be less than what counties pay to vendors.



Electronic Filing for the Future

- For an initial investment of \$5M, SC Courts would implement an initial electronic filing solution that the SC Courts would own and operate
- Each document submitted to the courts would have a small electronic filing fee that would be retained by the SC Courts
- Return on Investment (ROI) is estimated to be approximately \$7M+ annually
- Court documents would be accessible 24 x 7



For Good of the Order

- SC Courts are using current economic crisis as opportunity to further:
 - Streamline operations
 - Increase efficiencies and effectiveness
 - Find means for alternative sustainable funding sources
 - Increase public access to the courts
- Being good stewards of public trust and taxpayer dollars, SC Courts continue to be innovative leaders
