


- > South Carolina continues to have:

Funding Sources in 2000 Compared to This Year


Since 2000, the Judicial Department has developed multiple funding sources so all funding is not completely dependent upon appropriations from the Legislature.

Expenditures = \$65,608,824



SCJD Technology Roadmap





- > SCJD's employee security awareness activities continue
- > SCJD has strengthened the SC Courts' security policy
 - Stronger passwords
 - **❖** 90 day expiration of passwords
 - **❖** Computers automatically lock after 30 minutes
 - * Reimaging computers before issuing to new employees





Statewide Court Case Management System

- > The CMS and JMS systems continue to be enhanced
- > 2013 functionality includes:
 - Images available on the Central Index
 - 90+ other fixes and enhancements
- ➤ SCJD continues to be a key member of the SC Traffic Records Coordinating Committee. The Committee's mission is to implement an electronic ticketing system in South Carolina
- > SCJD is now hosting 41 of the 46 counties in its data center





Appellate Court Case Management System

- > Appellate CMS Milestones:
 - **❖Supreme Court justices and Court of Appeals judges are circulating opinions electronically**
 - **❖Statistical reporting is live**
 - ❖Public access. First phase of public access will go live this fall. Staff testing is underway

Electronic Filing

- ➤ The efiling contract was awarded July 1st to Tybera Corporation of Orem, Utah
- ➤ Tybera Corporation has over 10 years of efiling experience in more than 7 states and 5 large, metropolitan jurisdictions
- ➤ The Efiling Advisory Committee met August 8th to see a demonstration of Tybera's base application
- Customization of the system for South Carolina started August 9th
- ➢ Greenville, Richland, Charleston, and Clarendon will be the first pilot counties







Docket Management Task Force

- > Justice Kaye G. Hearn is Chair of the Docket **Management Task Force**
- > Purpose was to review court operations, consistency, and effectiveness to maximize the use of court resources
- > The Task Force was comprised of three subcommittees: Common Pleas, General Sessions, and Family Court
- > Orders implementing many of the Task Force's recommendations have been signed and others are pending

General Sessions Docket


- <u>Drain the Swamp</u>: An Administrative Order will be issued requiring Solicitors to reconcile their pending cases with Clerks of Courts and Public Defenders
- The Court is examining a system for differentiated case management which will set all cases on tracks or scheduling orders:
 - For cases <u>less</u> than 545 days old, Judges, Solicitors, and defense attorneys in counties which have in place a differentiated case management order tailored to that county will collaborate to set deadlines to process cases from bond hearings, the scheduling of first and second appearances, and the scheduling of pleas or trials
 - Cases <u>over</u> 545 days old will be exclusively managed by the Chief Judge for Administrative Purposes and will be either set for trial or dismissed






Fast Track Jury Trials

- > Fast Track Jury Trials adopted statewide on March 7th
- ➤ A Fast Track Jury Trial is a voluntary, binding jury trial before a reduced jury panel and a mutually selected Special Hearing Officer
- > Used on an ad hoc basis in Charleston and has proven to be successful.
- Fast Track Jury Trials:
 - **≻Last no more than 1 day**
 - **▶** Consist of no more than six jurors
 - ➤ Involve an abbreviated case presentation with relaxed rules of evidence
 - ➤ No post-trial motions or right to appeal
 - >Aids in the efficient use of judicial resources






- > Business Court Pilot Program extended through December 1st
- Presiding Judges:
 - Charleston Roger M. Young, Sr.
 - ❖ Greenville Edward W. Miller
 - Richland Clifton Newman
- > Purpose is to increase the efficiency of the civil court by addressing complex business, corporate, and commercial matters with specialized case management procedures
- Currently considering how and when to expand the pilot program statewide









Second Annual South Carolina Pro Bono Summit

The Second Annual Access to Justice Pro Bono Summit will be held on October 21st in conjunction with the ABA's National Pro Bono Celebration



➤ The first Summit was a huge success and led many law firms to adopt pro bono policies. It also inspired pro bono participation all over the state



Representatives from over 35 law firms and organizations will attend



Summit will be held annually





- Created by the Commission on the Profession to assist newly appointed Summary Court Judges in their progression to the bench
- Circuit and Family Court Judges as well as Masters-in-Equity shall serve as mentors to the new judges for one year
- Uniform mentoring plan will be provided
- > Objectives of the program:
 - Prepare new judges for their role in the judicial process
 - ❖ Teach high ethical standards and professionalism
- A certificate of completion will be provided at the end of the program





Family Court Update

- ➤ Child Support Enforcement System (CSES) continues to be developed by DSS now as a state project while in litigation with Hewitt Packard
- Family Court Case Management System (FCCMS) continues to be part of the DSS CSES project
- > The Clerks of Court are represented by David Hamilton and Beulah Roberts
- ➤ Smith Data/QS1's support of their Family Court applications will continue until the state's CFS applications are implemented





Judicial Department Recognized as 2013 Top Ten Court Websites

- ➤ The Forum on the Advancement of Court Technology (FACT) named sccourts.org among this year's winners of the <u>Top Ten Court Websites Award</u>
- ➤ A three-judge panel independently evaluates each website based on criteria such as: access to public records, electronic services offered, optimization for mobile technology, 508 compliance, and usability





Recognition by the Solicitors Regulation Authority of the United Kingdom

- ➤ South Carolina has been approved as a Recognized Jurisdiction for the Qualified Lawyer Transfer Scheme (QLTS) for the Solicitors Regulation Authority of the United Kingdom
- ➤ The QLTS is a series of tests that enables internationally qualified attorneys to become English solicitors
- ➤ To be eligible to take the QLTS assessments, you must be a qualified attorney in a recognized jurisdiction
- South Carolina attorneys are now eligible to take the QLTS assessments







National Conference of Appellate Court Clerks

- ▶ Jenny Kitchings, Clerk of Court of the SC Court of Appeals, and John Reynolds, Dynamic Solutions Coordinator, presented on the implementation of iPads in the appellate courts at the National Conference of Appellate Court Clerks (NCACC) in Seattle at the Court Technology Conference
- ➤ The presentation focuses on the judges' use of iPads at the Court of Appeals
- Our judges use iPads to access C-Track, view and annotate documents, electronically circulate opinions, view digital exhibits, and view audio and video recordings of oral arguments
